**GRANT TEAFF**  
**Monday, September 24**

Grant Teaff was named Executive Director of the American Football Coaches Association in February 1994. The 10,000 members of the American Football Coaches Association have had a front row seat as they watched the massive changes that have taken place in the Association in the last eleven years. Grant Teaff's outstanding career as a college coach has placed him in eight Halls of Fame, including the Texas Sports Hall of Fame, and the College Football Hall of Fame. He won 170 football games, two Southwest Conference Championships at Baylor, coached in 20 post season bowls and all-star games. He was Coach of the Year six times in the Southwest Conference, and received National Coach of the Year Awards from the American Football Coaches Association and the Football Writers Association. In 2006, Teaff was honored with the Amos Alonzo Stagg Award, one of the highest honors a coach can receive from the AFCA. As Executive Director of American Football Coaches Association he is involved in every issue that affects the college game, and has become a strong spokesman for the game of football. As a nationally known author and motivational speaker, Teaff loves to share his leadership techniques with those involved in education, the business world, and particularly with coaches. Teaff has written five books: "I Believe," "Winning," "Seasons of Glory," "Coaching in the Classroom" and "Grant Teaff with the Master Coaches."



**LARRY BLAKENEY**  
**Monday, September 17**

Larry Blakeney is in his 17th season as Head Football Coach of the Troy Trojans. Over that span, he has compiled a record of 128-64-1. Blakeney is the longest-serving and winningest head coach in Troy football history. In 2006, the Troy program took a huge step forward by capturing their first Sun Belt Conference title and winning the first bowl game in school history, a decisive 41-17 victory over Rice in the New Orleans Bowl. Coach Blakeney was a three-year letterman quarterback at Auburn for the legendary Ralph "Shug" Jordan from 1966-69. Blakeney earned a master's degree in education from the University of Montevallo in 1976. Prior to coming to Troy, Blakeney spent 14 years as an assistant at Auburn. Blakeney grew up in Gordo where he played football, basketball, and baseball at Gordo High School. He is married to the former Janice Powell and they have three daughters and three granddaughters.



**TOMMY TUBERVILLE**  
**Monday, September 10**  
**(Noon Luncheon)**

In his ninth season at Auburn, head coach Tommy Tuberville has established his program as one of the nation's elite. In the last three seasons, Tuberville has directed the Tigers to 33 wins and a .868 winning percentage (33-5) which is tied for third best in the country in both categories. The 2006 season saw Tuberville direct the Tigers to their second 10-win campaign in the previous three years, including a 17-14 victory over Nebraska in the AT&T Cotton Bowl Classic. His 2006 squad was the only program in the country to defeat two teams ranked in the top five nationally - National Champion Florida and LSU. His five straight victories over arch-rival Alabama has never been equaled. The season before Tuberville's arrival, Auburn finished with a dismal 3-8 overall record and a last place finish in the SEC Western Division. Tuberville guided the program back to the top of the league standings, leading Auburn to an SEC Championship, five Western Division titles including outright championships in 2000 and 2004 and co-championships in 2001, 2002 and 2005. Since 2000, the program has the best conference record among SEC teams with a mark of 42-14 (.750). Tuberville has directed Auburn to seven consecutive bowl appearances, including five New Year's Day bowl berths and three consecutive January 1 bowl games. Tuberville understands the process and commitment it takes to build a successful program. Coaching stops at perennial college football powers University of Miami and Texas A&M and a four-year head coaching stint at the University of Mississippi gave him the background in building and maintaining a successful program. Tuberville is married to the former Suzanne Fette of Guilford, Ind. They are the parents of two sons, Thomas Tucker (13) and Troy Allen (11).



## NEIL CALLAWAY Monday, October 1

Neil Callaway, who has been a part of successful football programs throughout his playing and coaching careers, was named the head coach at UAB on December 17, 2006. Callaway, who most recently had been the offensive coordinator at the University of Georgia for the past six seasons, becomes the third head coach in the history of the UAB football program. During his six years at UGA, Callaway was part

of a staff that won two SEC championships, three SEC Eastern Division titles, three bowl games, and had four top 10 finishes in the final national polls. In 2002, the Bulldogs finished as the SEC's top scoring (32.14 ppg) and pass efficiency (138.91) offense and the 'Dogs were second in scoring offense in 2005. Callaway, a native of Macon, Ga., and graduate of the University of Alabama, served as offensive line coach at Alabama in 1997 and line coach and offensive coordinator from 1998 to 2000. Prior to joining the Crimson Tide, he served as assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at Houston (1993-96). He was the long-time offensive line coach under head coach Pat Dye at Auburn (1981-92). Callaway also served on Dye's staff at Wyoming (1980) and at East Carolina (1978-79). Callaway and his wife, Karen, have three children, Russ, Kate, and Clay.



## REGGIE BARLOW Monday, October 8

Reggie Barlow was named Alabama State University's head football coach on May 4, 2007. For the past two seasons, Barlow worked as quarterbacks coach, serving as mentor and tutor to former ASU star and current NFL starting quarterback Tarvaris Jackson. After wrapping up an eight-year playing career that ended with a Super Bowl ring, the former ASU star wide receiver returned to his alma mater in 2005. Barlow

holds the school's all-time records with 133 receptions for 2,596 yards, which is 10th in Southwestern Athletic Conference history. He also holds the schools single-season record for receiving yards and has the SWAC's best single-season average in punt returns. He scored 17 career touchdowns and caught at least one pass in 36 of 41 games played, including the last 24. After his senior season, Barlow played in the Senior Bowl and Blue-Gray All-Star game. In a professional career that started with his selection in the fourth round of the 1996 NFL Draft by Jacksonville, Barlow established himself as one of the best punt returners in NFL history, finishing in the top-10 in return average. He was selected as the first alternate kick returner for the Pro Bowl following the 1998 season. He owns the Jaguars career records for most punt returns (79), most punt return yards (967) and average per return (12.2), as well as single-season records for most punt returns (55 in 1998), most punt return yards (555 in 1998) and average per return (12.9 in 1998). Barlow played five seasons with Jacksonville, one with the Oakland Raiders, and two with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, where he was a member of a Super Bowl championship team in 2001. He is married to the former Tracy Kidd and they have two children, Reggie Jr. and Simone.



## JIMMY SEXTON Monday, October 15

Jimmy Sexton is president of the Memphis firm Athletic Resource Management, a sports management and marketing agency that handles the contract negotiations, endorsements, day to day management and investments for over 80 professional athletes and coaches. At age 23, Jimmy was the youngest person ever licensed by the NBA and the NFL to represent member players in contract negotiations, and has been

doing so for over 20 years. Jimmy has negotiated numerous contracts that were records in that sport. Some clients that Jimmy represents include former NFL Head Coach Bill Parcells (currently with ESPN) and Head college coaches Tommy Tuberville, Nick Saban, Phillip Fulmer, and Houston Nutt. He also represents NFL players Philip Rivers, Isaac Bruce, Jason Witten, and D'Angelo Williams as well as NBA players Corliss Williamson and Earl Barron. Jimmy is responsible for the day to day management of well over 300 million dollars of athletic contracts for his clients and enjoys helping clients obtain exposure by negotiating commercials, exclusive corporate relationships and public appearances. Jimmy attended the University of Tennessee graduating in 1986 with a B.A. in political science/business. He currently lives in the Memphis suburb of Collierville with his sons, James, Parker, and Blake.



## JACKIE SHERILL Monday, October 22

Jackie Sherrill enjoyed a long coaching career that spanned from 1976-2003. Coach Sherrill now works for Fox Sports Southwest as a college football analyst. Sherrill lettered four seasons at the University of Alabama and played on Coach Paul Bryant's 1964 and 1965 national championship teams. He served as a graduate assistant at Alabama and Arkansas before becoming an assistant coach at Iowa State University in 1970. In 1973, Sherrill became

the assistant head coach at the University of Pittsburgh under Coach Johnny Majors. In 1976, Sherrill became the head coach at Washington State University. In 1977, when Majors left to go to Tennessee he became the head coach at the University of Pittsburgh. While at Pittsburgh, Sherrill recruited Heisman Trophy winner Tony Dorsett. In 1982 he became head coach at Texas A & M. While with the Aggies, Sherrill won three consecutive Southwest Conference Championships. Sherrill served as head coach at Mississippi State from 1991-2003. During his tenure the Bulldogs enjoyed the best run of success in the school's history including multiple appearances in the national Top 25 rankings. In 1998, the Bulldogs won the SEC's Western Division Championship. Overall, Sherrill compiled a 180-120-4 record as a head coach. Sherrill received many awards during his career including two Southeastern Conference coach of the year awards. Sherrill also won the prestigious Walter Camp Award in 1980. Sherrill was born November 28, 1943 in Duncan, Oklahoma. He is married to the former Peggy Breaux and they have three daughters and two sons.



## MIKE TURK Monday, October 29

Mike Turk begins his fourth season leading the Huntingdon Hawks football program. Prior to Huntingdon, Turk coached 13 years at Troy (State) University. A graduate of Jeff Davis High School in Montgomery, Turk became a walk-on quarterback for Troy in the spring of 1984 and became a prominent figure on the Trojan field and sideline for two decades before returning to his hometown roots. As the Trojan running backs coach, Turk was responsible

for building one of the nation's most consistent running games. Three of his running backs (Eddie Coleman, Arrid Gregory and Joe Jackson) have rushed for more than 2,000 career yards. During his 12 seasons as running backs coach at Troy, Turk had nine players to earn all-conference honors. A native of Montgomery, Ala., Turk earned his undergraduate degree in physical education and a master's degree in education from Troy State. He is married to the former Danielle Warren of Alexander City. They have two sons, Jimbo and Jake.



## JAMIE NEWBERG Monday, November 5

Jamie Newberg is regarded as one of the top authorities on college football recruiting. In 1996, he launched the website and publication called Border Wars, which covered Southeastern football recruiting and the website quickly became the most popular of its kind. He also served as analyst and co-host on Fox Sports South's college football recruiting show "Countdown to Signing Day" from 1997 to 2006. Newberg has also done color commentary on high

school football games in Georgia on TV33 since 1999. He appears on radio shows from coast to coast and has worked for the Atlanta - Journal and Constitution and 790 The Zone in Atlanta. Newberg also frequently does color commentary for CSS and Fox Sports South. In 2002, Newberg became the National College Football Analyst for Scout.com and is now in charge of recruiting operations for Scout.com. He resides in St. Petersburg, Florida.



## TONY BARNHART Monday, November 12

The 2007 football season will be Tony Barnhart's 31st as a reporter for newspaper, television and radio. Barnhart is in his 24th year with the Atlanta-Journal Constitution and currently serves as National College Sports Writer. In addition, Tony has his own radio show "The Southern Football Kickoff Show" on WQXI, 790 The Zone. Tony's television show, "Talkin' Football" is shown each Sunday night on CSS. Tony has written three books on college football: "Southern Fried Football - The History, Passion and Glory of the Great Southern Game", "What It Means To Be A Bulldog" and his latest book, "Vince Dooley - My 40 Years at Georgia." Tony was named Georgia Sportswriter of the Year in 1999 and is a former member of the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame's prestigious Honors Court. In July of 2006, he received the Jake Wade Award from the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). Tony is a 1976 graduate of the Henry W. Grady School of Journalism at the University of Georgia. He lives in Atlanta with his wife, Maria. Their daughter, Sara, is a third-year student at the University of Georgia School of Law.



## BOBBY WALLACE Monday, November 26

Bobby Wallace begins his first season as the new head football coach at The University of West Alabama. Prior to arriving in Livingston, he had served as the head coach at Temple University since 1997. Wallace's first head coaching stint came in the GSC when he was the head coach at the University of North Alabama from 1988-1997. During his time at UNA, he led the Lions to three consecutive national championships from 1993-1995, as his squads finished with an overall record of 41-1 during the course of those three seasons. The 1995 team was selected as the "Best Team of the Quarter Century" in Division II. Wallace also led UNA to Gulf South Conference Championships during the 1993-1995 seasons, while his Lions also qualified for the NCAA Division II Playoffs six times during his tenure. Over his 10 seasons at the helm, he compiled an overall mark of 82-36-1, and he also produced a total of 12 NFL players. He was named the GSC Coach of the Year three straight seasons from 1993-1995, while also being named the NCAA Division II National Coach of the Year during that same span. In 1997, he was named the first Division II Coach of the Quarter Century, before being inducted into the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame in 2004. He has also served as defensive backs coach at Illinois, Mississippi State, Auburn, Wyoming and East Carolina, where his teams were consistently ranked in the top five nationally in pass defense. During his stint at Auburn, he was noted for recruiting and signing Bo Jackson. Wallace and his wife Sharon are the parents of three children.



## MAL MOORE Monday, December 10 (Awards Banquet)

Mal Moore was hired on November 23, 1999 as Director of Athletics at the University of Alabama. Moore's stint as A.D. is the latest phase of his 30-plus years of service to the Capstone. As a player and coach at Alabama, Moore was part of seven national championships, 14 SEC championships, and 27 bowl trips. Alabama capitalized on that background, and Moore's popularity, by naming him as Associate Director of External Affairs in 1994, a position that required constant travel to speaking engagements around the Southeast. A 1963 graduate of the University of Alabama, Moore holds both an undergraduate degree in Sociology and a 1964 Master's Degree in Secondary Education from the Capstone. A scholarship player for Coach Paul Bryant, Moore was a member of Alabama's 1961 national championship team. Coaching football for 31 years, 22 of those at Alabama, provided Moore with a wealth of experience and knowledge in the world of college athletics. As a coach, Moore served as Bryant's graduate assistant in 1964 and then Alabama's defensive backfield coach from 1965-70. He served as the Tide's quarterbacks coach from 1971-1982 and from 1975-82 took on the additional responsibility and elevated role as the Tide's offensive coordinator. In addition to Alabama, his coaching career included stops at Montana State, Notre Dame and the NFL's Phoenix Cardinals. Moore was born December 19, 1939 in Dozier, Alabama. He has been married to the former Charlotte Davis of Tuscaloosa since July 20, 1968. They have one daughter and two grandchildren.
